Guest Speaker, March 15th Dean Stephen Thorsett

We will welcome Stephen Thorsett, Professor of Astronomy and Astrophysics and Dean of the Division of Physical and Biological Sciences. His talk will be titled *Rising Above the Gathering Storm: Science and Economic Development*. In 2007, an influential report, similarly titled, described the long-term economic and societal consequences faced by the United States because of its continually declining investment in science education and research. The



current economic crisis makes it even more urgent, leading the new administration in Washington to propose substantial new investments in education, research, and infrastructure. Dean Thorsett will talk about some related initiatives at UCSC, including the innovative California Teach program for increasing the number of highly qualified secondary school math and science teachers. The one-hour talk will start at 11:15 a.m.

Guest Speaker, April 19th Marco Barricelli, Artistic Director, Shakespeare Santa Cruz

Marco Barricelli's talk will be titled Building a Season at Shakespeare Santa Cruz. Their three plays this season will be A Midsummer Night's Dream, Julius Caesar, and Shipwrecked! An Entertainment. The Amazing Adventures of Louis De Rougemont (as told by himself). Mr. Barricelli will discuss why he chose these plays, the process of developing them in a repertory format, and the impact of funding shortfalls. The last half hour will be devoted to a Q&A session with the audience.

Miriam Ellis, Lecturer in French emerita and our favorite renaissance woman, will continue her popular class on Romanticism. This year she will focus on the German

She will then discuss how French and Italian composers, including Gounod, Massenet, Thomas, Boito, and Verdi, have adapted these German texts to the operatic stage. In addition, recordings of various art songs and DVDs of the operas will illustrate basic Romantic elements in the musical interpretations.

President's Message **Lifelong Learners in Interesting Times**

UCSC Lifelong Learners will be 25 years old next year. This milestone is a testimony to the many men and women who have participated over the years. LLL has always been a volunteer organization. No leader, board member, or interest group leader has ever received a penny in compensation for what they have contributed to us all. In fact, with very few exceptions, no presenter at our general meetings has received an honorarium. They all offer their knowledge, talents, and energy freely, and we are all the beneficiaries. We have stoutly insisted on volunteerism and on maintaining the lowest possible fees for membership, interest groups, courses, and social events. And even with our low fees, we still manage to offer book scholarships to many reentering students affiliated with STARS (Services to Transfer and Reentry Students), our UCSC liaison group.

I believe that these traditions are crucial to what makes LLL so vital, and that we should preserve and honor them as we go forward.

It's not that LLL hasn't changed, however. The most notable change, of course, is our organization's size. It started with a dozen or two members in 1984; membership is now hovering around 350. We have outgrown several meeting spaces. Our expenses have increased over the years. Free meeting space is difficult to find, and food, postage, printing, and website expenses continue to grow. Moreover, as our membership has increased, just managing the bookkeeping has become a much bigger task than it used to be. We

have come to the point where we may need to think about seeking some parttime help.

As we've been thinking about all of these "interesting" challenges, we have become aware of the Bernard Osher Foundation's program in support of "Osher Lifelong Learning Institutes" on many university and college campuses. In conversations with the foundation and the university, we have learned that they offer grants to organizations just like ours. The only requirement they have for granting an endowment that would provide some permanent funding going forward is that the organization have a minimum of 500 paid members. This number, they reason, insures viability and sustainability over the long term.

If the university were to successfully apply for this grant on our behalf, we would be given time to reach 500 members. With the grant we could get bookkeeping and operational help, pay for meeting spaces for courses and lectures, and use all of our current fees to increase our scholarship offerings.

We are only in the most preliminary discussions with the Osher Foundation and UCSC about this possibility. I wanted to give all our members a heads -up, and promise to keep you posted as matters unfold. In any case, no decision can be made without the approval of the membership. Should the LLL Board decide to recommend this action, there will be ample time for discussion and evaluation before a vote. Stay tuned.

Wine Tasting Group Visits Soquel Vineyards

On a sunny afternoon in January, the wine-tasting interest group visited Soquel Vineyards. The vineyards command a grand view of Monterey Bay from high above Soquel on Glen Haven road. The roof of the winery building is of handmade Italian tiles dating from 1751.

Proprietor Peter Bargetto demonstrated the correct method of pruning grape vines. He also explained some of the intricacies of grape growing and production, as well as wine making, which made for an enlightening visit.



But the event really was about the fruit of the vine. We sampled the vineyard's Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardon-



nay, Pinot Noir, Zinfandel, and their Trinity blend. Fine wines all!



We finished with a barrel tasting of a Pinot Noir that they will bottle in the Fall.


