## OLLI has moved to the Colleges 9/10 Multipurpose Room for General Meetings

OLLI is moving! We have a new campus home. Our general meetings this year will be in the Multipurpose Room of Colleges 9 and 10, where we met this past month. See map on page 11.

This is not simply a move to a greatly improved venue for our monthly Sunday morning general meetings. We've always wanted a deeper connection with the life of the campus and with students and faculty in the rich tapestry of campus life. Our experience with the Ears in Action and English in Action interest groups showed we had something of value to offer to students that is also enormously rewarding for us.

During the spring, an OLLI Facilities Task Force approached the Colleges 9/10 administration: Professor Flora Lu, Provost; Deana Slater, College Administrative Officer; and Kyoko Freeman, the now retired College Programs Coordinator. (The new person in this position is Esther Wallace.) In a series of meetings we began to imagine what a mutually beneficial relationship between OLLI and Colleges 9/10 might be like. Colleges 9/10

folks, for their part, warmly embraced the idea of OLLI being a part of their community. There were many ideas, and we agreed to spend this year exploring possibilities.

Here's one that is already happening: Colleges 9/10 offers a program called Language Tables. Enjoy lunch and speak with, listen to, or engage with speakers of a number of languages. See page 5 of this newsletter.

Another idea: We are exploring the possibility of OLLI members partnering with undergrads who are not native English speakers and who would love to have the opportunity for informal English conversations. Our courses provide opportunities for our members to delve more deeply into fascinating subjects, hear from outstanding teachers, and have fun as well: no exams, no grades, but ample opportunities to participate in discussions.

It is important that you sign up two, or better, three weeks before the start of the course so that the room can be readied and we can e-mail you the handouts that some of the teachers prepare.

The courses vary a great deal in length, but the donation we ask for each course is the same — \$20/person/course. Because the lecturers are not compensated (except for the pleasure of having truly interested and interesting students), your contributions are used for scholarships for re-entry and transfer students.

For courses with limited enrollment please note the following. For online registrations you will receive an email from the University acknowledging your acceptance in the course. However you register you will eventually receive a letter from the university acknowledging your donation.

You will not be charged if you can not be enrolled, and if you sent a check it will be returned.

### Espresso — Michel Singher

Friday November 6 and 13; 11:15 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. in the music room of the Peace United Church of Santa Cruz, 900 High Street.

This course will serve as an introduction to the performance by Espresso on January 7, 2016 of Gustav Mahler's "Das Lied von der Erde."

- Who was Gustav Mahler?
- Overview of his prior seven symphonies
- Explications of the poems and their sources
- The Mahler/Schoenberg relationship
- Detailed examination of the musical composition as a composition, and of its relationship to the text

Michel Singher is Artistic Director of the newly founded Espresso—a small, intense orchestra. He had retired as Coordinator of Opera at SJSU. Previous academic positions included music director of orchestras and opera and teaching conducting, first at the University of Washington, then at the Oberlin Conservatory of

Music. (He conducted a Mahler symphony on each occasion, respectively the Fourth and the Second.)

Off campus, Michel has been an opera conductor in Hamburg, Antwerp, Buffalo, Denver, and Phoenix, among many other pits, and has surfaced on the symphonic podiums of the Berlin Radio Symphony, Hamburg Symphony and Seattle Symphony. He and his abstract-painter wife, Elizabeth Kaminski, moved from New York to Felton ten years ago, and say they've not regretted it a single day.

### Vladimir Putin's Russia Prof. Peter Kenez

Monday December 7 and 14 from 10 a.m. to noon at the Museum of Art and History.

Peter Kenez is Emeritus Professor of History at UCSC and a founding faculty member of Stevenson College. Peter's research and teaching have focused on Russian and Eastern European History, Soviet film, and the widely acclaimed interdisciplinary course on the Holocaust taught with Murray Baumgarten. He is the author

of nine books including the autobiographical "Varieties of Fear" and most recently "The Coming of the Holocaust: From Antisemitism to Genocide." A native of Hungary Peter left in 1956 and has returned often to teach and do research.

## Colleges 9/10 Invites OLLI Members to Language Tables

Do you speak another language? Do you wonder what another language sounds like, or how to say something in another language? Would you like to meet folks who speak different languages and enjoy sharing their languages with others? Then the Language Tables program of Colleges 9 and 10 may be a special treat. Every few weeks the Language Tables program operates over lunch at special tables set up in the Multipurpose Room of Colleges 9 and 10. This is the same room where OLLI now holds our monthly Sunday meetings

You do not have to be a fluent speaker of the language, or even a rudimentary one. Anyone of any skill level is welcome to sit at any table — we welcome everyone from casually interested folks to beginning learners to native speakers! Just have an interest in how people can communicate in the different languages. You can ask questions (in English) or try out pronunciation of a new word or phrase. This is an opportunity to stretch and discover with student speakers, while enjoying lunch together.

Everyone is welcome. For \$10.32 lunch is available in the cafeteria adjacent to the Multipurpose Room. However, you can also bring a bag lunch and enjoy the experience.

The next language tables event is scheduled for Tuesday November 10 from 12 to 2 p.m.

A \$35 contribution to the OLLI at UCSC is recommended to participate in the interest-group program. A participant

in the interest-group program may be active in any number of Interest Groups which have room. When you join or renew your membership, you will have the opportunity at the same time to join the interest-group program. You can also join the interest-group program *after* becoming a member. The four-chambered heart of OLLI at UCSC consists of our courses, our monthly general meetings at Colleges 9/10, our community involvement, and our peer-led Interest Groups, which give our members opportunities to take part in discussions, explorations, and other indoor and outdoor activities.

One of the missions of OLLI at UCSC is to raise scholarship money for transfer and re-entry students, including military veterans. Our interest group leaders and course teachers are in part motivated by the scholarships made possible by their volunteer work. Our Osher Foundation grant can be used for our expenses, but cannot be used for student scholarships. Your donations are used for scholarships.

We encourage members to form new Interest Groups and new sections of existing Interest Groups. Leaders of groups are often willing to give advice on how their groups operate.

We have permanently moved from Stevenson to the Colleges 9/10 Multipurpose Room for our regular meetings. See story on the cover page of this newsletter.

Our members gather monthly, September through May inclusive, except in December, usually on the third Sunday, from 10 a.m. to noon, in the Colleges 9/10 Multipurpose Room, where we socialize, conduct business, and hear a speaker, often a UCSC professor. We greet, meet, and eat (cake or fruit, with coffee or tea), and interact with a speaker of note. At the first meeting of the year after the summer break, in September, in lieu of hearing from a speaker, we find out about and sign-up for interest groups.

**UCSC requires permits** to park in most parking lots throughout the campus. Permits cost \$4.00 per car. OLLI is providing a carpool discount rate of \$2.00 per car for carpools with of three or more occupants. Carpooling will reduce the per person cost of parking, and is good for the environment. Shuttle service to and from the East Remote Parking Lot along Hagar Drive is provided. There is no charge for parking at this lot on the weekends.

Student Parking Agents will sell \$2.00 carpool or regular \$4.00 permits at the entrance to the parking areas identified with an asterisk (\*) on the parking map on the facing page. Permits are good for 24 hours.

### Steps to Follow

We meet in the Colleges 9/10 Multipurpose Room.

**STEP 1.** If you choose to park at the lots to the west of the Multipurpose Room along College Ten Road, you will be greeted by a Student Parking Agent who will sell parking permits at the rates noted above. Lots are identified with an asterisk (\*) on the map. The most direct route to these lots is via Hagar Drive, left at McLaughlin Drive and right at College Ten Road.

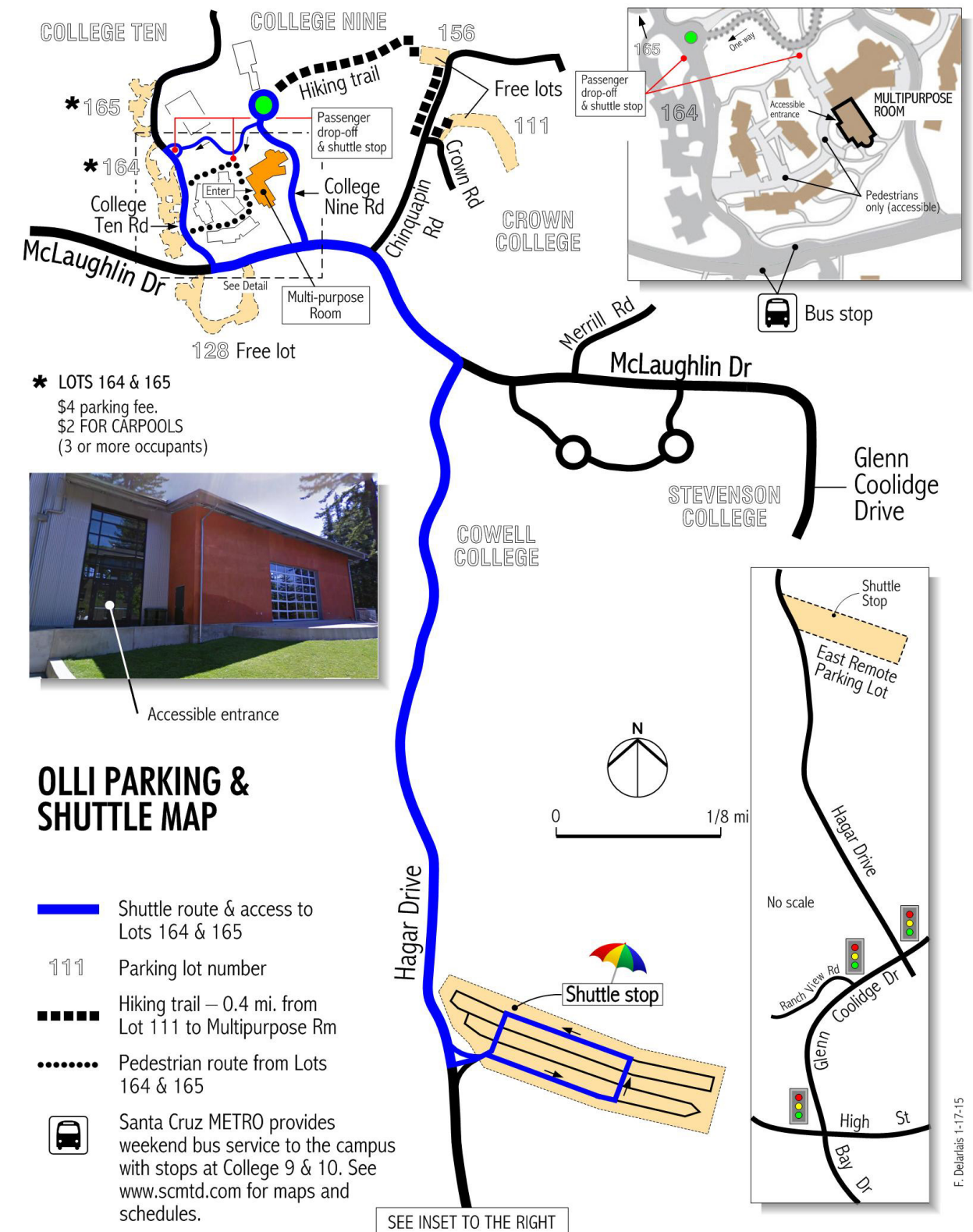
**STEP 2.** If you choose our shuttle service, your best route to the East Remote Parking Lot is the Main Entrance at Bay and High via Glenn Coolidge Drive and Hagar Drive. After you enter the lot, look for the large multicolored umbrella at our shuttle stop.

### Information for Members with a Handicap

Anyone with a DMV handicap placard or license plate may park in the following spaces:

- ADA (a.k.a. Accessible) parking spaces
- “A” spaces
- Medical spaces
- in time zones (e.g., 10-minute spaces) for longer than the time specified
- in meters and paystation spaces without additional payment when no other parking is available.
- If there are no marked parking space, you can park in open areas as long as you don’t park in fire lanes, tow-away zones, or next to red curbs. You also can’t block other vehicles, access to dumpsters or loading docks, buildings, sidewalks, pathways, or traffic.
