Professor of Film and Digital Media Colleges Nine & Ten Multipurpose Room, 10:00 AM

Professor Shelly Stamp, Ph.D., a leading expert on women and early film culture, is

interested in tracing the contributions women made to early Hollywood as filmmakers, moviegoers, performers, critics and theorists. Her research has been supported by grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, and the UC President's Fellowship. She's served as a consultant for the National Film Preservation Foundation, EYE Film Institute Netherlands, Turner Classic Movies, and the American Movie Classics cable channel. Dr. Stamp's expert commentary has appeared on several



DVD releases of rare silent films. She is the Founding Editor of Feminist Media Histories: An International Journal and is currently at work on a comprehensive history of Women and the Silent Screen in America, co-authored with Anne Morey.

Getting to know STARS New Director: Sara Radoff

Interviewed by Johnna Laird

"THINKING ... BEYOND THE BOX" ... "TRANSCENDING BOUNDARIES"

t lunch time, Sara Radoff steps from her desk to walk UCSC's tree -laden campus. A few minutes outdoors reconnects her with nature, providing a needed creativity-boost.

New Director of Services for Transfer and Re-entry Students (STARS), Sara creates policies and initiates programs so nontraditional students successfully navigate UCSC's educational system. Since nontraditional students can find themselves feeling unwelcome at institutions built decades ago for middle class-right-out-of high school students, Sara's job calls for massive creativity, thinking outside and beyond the box.

UCSC serves about 2,800 transfer students, 100 veterans, 100 former foster youth, and student parents. A "hightouch, high relationship" program, STARS provides an open-door policy and all-day drop-in hours for guidance and counseling. Sara oversees a staff of seven that provides innovative initiatives where students of similar backgrounds gather to share experiences. STARS' pipeline program from community college helps students, often first in their family to be college-bound, to envision themselves at UCSC's research-one school where they can work alongside professors uncovering and creating knowledge, not just acquiring it.

OLLI provides \$45,000 annually in scholarships to help with STARS students' biggest barrier: tuition, books and related expenses. OLLI is one of several organizations and private endowments supporting nontraditional students.

Since STARS operates as OLLI's interface with UCSC, Sara serves on OLLI's board to help OLLI navigate UCSC's policies. Sara finds this diversity in ages from students to retirees enriching, seeing the world through different experiences and perspectives.

Her work to make the world more equitable and just is likely rooted in childhood where her parents—a Jewish father and Protestant mother—faced discrimination. "They experienced adversity to be in love with each other," she recalls.

She views her life's work as "transcending boundaries," and "coming from a place of love to bridge differences that separate us." In higher education that translates into eliminating policies that discriminate against nontraditional students.

When her day ends, Santa Cruz outdoor recreation beckons. Sara enjoys surfing, gardening, and walking on the beach with Baker, her two-year-old Australian Shepherd. Ready for adventure, she picked up power tools this year, learning to use a chop saw and working alongside her husband, a carpenter, to remodel their house.

Sara earned degrees in Philosophy from the University of Montana (B.A) and in Society, Culture and Politics from University of British Columbia (M.A.). Before arriving at UCSC, she worked as Service-Learning Program Coordinator at Western Washington University and Manager of Safety and Learning Abroad at University of British Columbia. She served as Academic Preceptor for UCSC's Oakes College for three years before accepting the STARS Directorship. Sara is a native of Massachusetts.

Practical Activism Conference

OLLI members were among the hundreds of people from campus and the community who participated in the 15th annual Practical Activism Conference on Saturday, Oct 21 at the Colleges Nine and Ten Multipurpose Room. Dozens of campus and community organizations set up booths with information and activities where people could learn about a range of efforts to make better world.

I learned so much. For example, at one booth I learned about why there is such a push these days around gender pronouns, and what some of the possibilities are. "They," for instance, is gender neutral and allows people who feel that they have some of both gender in their way of being, despite the biological facts, to indicate their determination not to have to choose one or the other. It reminded me of the controversy when I was younger about the use of the title "Ms." instead of "Miss" or "Mrs." to designate a woman's name. "Ms" was controversial and ridiculed by some, I remember, but now I just think, why is it important to know whether a woman you meet is married or single? Men don't have such a distinction. So, I think it is worth reflecting on this gender pronoun thing, and I'm grateful to the students who did the research and prepared a fascinating booth on the topic.

I learned at another booth about the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program (DACA) and how UCSC students who are Dreamers are faring.

There were several workshops, led by students, on various topics like immigration, environment and racism.

Finally, there were two presentations. The Keynote Speaker, Zahra Billoo, the Bay Area Executive Director of the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), gave a brilliant but also entertaining talk on the importance of both diversity and unity. The Oakland-based poet Porsche Kelly kept the audience spellbound as she performed her beautiful and insightful poems.

Like the Alternative Spring Break, the Practical Activism Conference offers OLLI members the opportunity to learn together with UCSC students. This is the primary goal of our growing and rewarding partnership with Colleges Nine and Ten. The conference is held every October.



1805 - The Beauty of Mathematics: Numbers, Sets of Numbers, Infinities

We will define numbers: integers, fractions, all the numbers. Of course, there are infinitely many integers, fractions, numbers. Can we quantify the magnitude of these infinite sets? To answer



this, we will ask: how do we define infinite? Is infinite just plain infinite, or are there infinities of different magnitudes?

In the process of examining these concepts, we will occasionally give proofs, while being careful to not bore and not be too formal. We will take small detours to amuse the mind. We will try to glimpse the beauty of mathematics you may have always wanted to grasp but may have not had a chance to. The only prerequisite to this class is curiosity about these topics. Nothing beyond elementary school mathematics will be assumed.

Course Leader: "I am a lapsed mathematician. I have a Master degree in mathematics from the University of Bucharest, Romania, and a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago. I started a bumpy academic career as a mathematician, but swerved at some point and became a software engineer. Throughout my software engineering career, my love and awe for mathematics has never cleared from my system. Now, in retirement, I am trying to steer back to mathematics a bit, doing what is most pleasant: solving little problems and talking about subjects in Mathematics."

It Can Be Done!

When a prospective new member phoned me to find out how to join and register for a class, I recommended using our online service. Mailed-in applications go through the US Postal Service and then to UCSC's post office before being sorted and forwarded to our office at STARS. That takes time. Joining, renewing, or signing up for a course using our online process can be far speedier. HOWEVER, before you can proceed to conduct your business with OLLI for the first time you need to register with the university from our website: olli.ucsc.edu A return email from UCSC will give you your ACCOUNT ID and a temporary password. Use the link in the email to create a permanent password. Store your password in a secure location! Most problems with the website are passwordrelated. You will now be able to complete any transaction — join, renew or sign up for classes.


I can't promise everybody it will be that easy because there can be short delays at the university, but online registration really is the way to go. BE SURE TO CHECK YOUR JUNK EMAIL, OR SPAM INBOX FOR THE REPLY FROM THE UNIVERSITY if it doesn't show up in your regular inbox, because it lands there frequently! It may take two or three days to receive a reply from the University.

Course Sign-up Process

Best way to register is online. Go to: olli.ucsc.edu

- 1. Click on "Fall Courses" box part-way down on the home page.
- 2. Select "Click Here to Register for Courses On-line."
- 3. Enter your email address and password.
- 4. Select "Courses" on the "OLLI Transaction Web site."
- 5. Select "Register for OLLI Course."
- 6. Fill out or update your personal information.
- 7. Select "Next".
- 8. Select the course(s) you wish to attend, then select "Next" for payment section.
- If you wish to mail in your application and payment, you can download a form at Step 2. Donation is \$20 per course. Check or credit card is accepted. Do not mail cash.


