Dr. Adam Millard-Ball

Assistant Professor in the Environmental Studies Department at the UC Santa Cruz

Dr. Millard-Ball's research bridges urban planning and environmental economics to address some of the key challenges in transportation, energy and climate change policy. His current work examines global patterns of urban sprawl and car ownership, the effectiveness of local climate planning efforts, and the design of carbon trading programs. He also has broad interests in transportation planning and policy, particularly parking management programs to reduce vehicle travel and emissions.



Before coming to UC Santa Cruz, he was an assistant professor in the Department of Geography and McGill School of Environment, McGill University. He holds a Ph.D. in Environment and Resources from Stanford University and was formerly a principal with the transportation planning firm Nelson\Nygaard Consulting Associates.

Miriam, opera-lover extraordinaire, will be putting the spotlight on various unforgettable scenes in opera—their

structure, function, and, above all, musical and dramatic impact. She will look at excerpts from a group of popular operas to analyze what has made them and certain of their scenes endure over time. She will highlight specific elements within the scenes, consider their textual and musical components, and discuss why certain of their arias or ensemble pieces are so beloved among opera buffs. She will also note those that have been adopted into popular culture by film, ads, or the media.

Miriam Ellis, Ph.D, has offered great admired classes for Lifelong Learners and OLLI for many years, both before and since her retirement from UCSC, where she taught French language and theater as well as other courses for over 30 years. In 2001, with Language colleagues, she founded The UCSC International Playhouse (now the Miriam Ellis International Playhouse), which will present its 18th annual season of multilingual theater in May, 2018.

~~> Sunday, April 15th, 3 pm, Colligan Theater in the Tannery Arts Complex: A tryptich of works by Beethoven ("Rondino"), Schubert's friend Franz Lachner ("Nonet"), and the suave and witty Jean Francaix ("Dixtuor"). (Apr. 5th and 12th classes precede the concert.)

Michel Singher founded Espressivo in 2015 at a late phase of a long career. Born in Paris, raised in New York, and

educated at Harvard College and Indiana University, Singher began professional life in Germany, where he remained through his mid-30s. While in Europe he occupied the podia of the Hamburg State Opera and the Royal Flemish Opera (Antwerp), as well as those of the Hamburg Symphony, Berlin Radio Symphony Orchestra, Basel Symphony, and Nuremberg Symphony. Back home, he has conducted the Seattle Symphony and the major opera companies of Anchorage, Buffalo, Denver, Phoenix and San Jose, among several others. He also served as Professor of Orchestral Conducting at the Oberlin Conservatory.

Dr. Roger Knacke is Emeritus Professor of Physics and Astronomy, Penn State Erie, and retired as Director of the

School of Science in 2010. He received his Ph.D. from UC Berkeley and has held positions at SUNY Stony Brook, Max Planck Institute for Kernphysik Heidelberg, NASA Ames, NASA Huntsville, and a postdoctoral position at UC Santa Cruz. He has authored or co-



authored more than 100 papers on interstellar and circumstellar matter and planetary atmospheres. His courses for OLLI have been enlightening, interesting, and even entertaining.

1814 - Santa Cruz Shakespeare 2018

March 27, April 3, 10, 17

We are fortunate to again have Prof. Michael Warren, a very knowledgeable and vastly entertaining Shakespeare scholar, presenting a course for us. His courses for OLLI for the previous seven years have been enthusiastically praised by our members.

The four lectures will be devoted to the plays of the 2018 Santa Cruz Shakespeare season: Love's Labour's Lost and Romeo and Juliet. Both plays date from the point in Shakespeare's early career when he established himself in London as the major playwright of the 1590s. Love's Labour's Lost is a witty comedy of male-female relations, a work of extraordinary originality and verbal

sophistication. Romeo and Juliet is a more famous and popular play, a tragedy of young lovers amid civil conflict in a Renaissance Italian city.

We will devote two meetings to each play. Members of the course should read the first four acts of Love's Labour's Lost for the first class.

Michael Warren is Emeritus Professor of English Literature at UCSC. He serves as Textual Consultant and dramaturge for Santa Cruz Shakespeare. He is a past president of the Shakespeare Association of America.

1815 - Genesis Stories

April 4, 11, 18 10:00 am-Noon

Location: Museum of Art and History

705 Front Street, Santa Cruz Instructor: Gildas Hamel

This class will present the best known stories of Genesis 1-11 in three meetings: the creation of the world and the Garden of Eden (Gen 1-2:4a; 2:4b-3:24), Cain and Abel

(Gen 4), the flood and the tower of Babel (Gen 6-9; 11). We will discuss the historical and mythological background and wonder how different, and why,



these narratives were from the tales told by the neighbors of Israel. Each meeting will invite broad discussions of the meanings of these episodes and their significance for ancient writers and interpreters as well as for all of us who may be interested in the notions of creation, fault, violence, sacrifice, and political power. I will also present some of the images associated with these passages.

Professor Gildas Hamel, a true Renaissance man, was born in Brittany, he taught high school in Jerusalem in 1966-68 while attending courses at the École Biblique where he fell in love with scholarship. He became an instructor in French at UCSC in 1974, earned a Ph.D. in history in 1983, and continued to teach French as well as classical languages and history. His classes for OLLI have been insightful and historically fascinating.

1816 - Two Works by Melville: Bartleby, The Scrivener and Benito Cereno

May 1, 8, 15, 22 10:00 am-noon Location: Lounge, Peace United Church,

Instructor: Forrest Robinson

A close analysis of two classic short tales by the great American master. We'll start with an overview of Melville's life and work, followed by two sessions each on the stories. This should be lots of fun.

Forrest Robinson is a Distinguished Professor of Humanities Emeritus. He taught at UCSC for 44 years in literature and American Studies. He has written extensively about Melville and has offered both graduate and undergraduate courses on him and his work. His past courses for OLLI—one on Melville and the other on Mark Twain—were received enthusiastically by OLLI members.





Spotlight III: Theater and Its Elements

Come and learn about all things theater, onstage and off. Under the expert direction of Margot Hoffman, we will explore technical, literary and performance elements of theater. This course will kindle your creativity and build confidence as we fill our theatrical toolkit with fun games and meaningful



discussions. Workshops this year will examine forms such as opera, commedia del arte, musical theater, street theater, Shakespeare and more. Topics also include theater production and management, working as an actor in 2018, auditions, and film versus stage.

Margot is hoping to create an OLLI group that works towards a performance by the end of the course. She assures us that it will be a no-pressure performance filled with "outside of the box" fun. 
OLLI Teachers Emeriti

JOHN DIZIKES was our very first teacher. One summer, long ago, he began reading poetry with us. That was our


very first class. He has continued to talk with us about many poets---T. S. Eliot, Emily Dickinson, W. H. Auden, Marianne Moore, Dorothy Parker, Emily Dickinson, and others. But he has also enlightened us on so many other subjects—The American Musical, George Bernard Shaw, architecture, history, opera, and more. John



demonstrated an encyclopedic understanding and joy in everything he discussed with us. Moreover, John was instrumental in creating our program of courses by successfully encouraging his fellow faculty members to teach for us.


BOB GOFF shared both his academic and extracurricular interests with us. He was a professor of philosophy and

Navigating Retirement
The Joys of Our Interest Group

As I looked around the dining room on December 20, 2017, I felt gratified seeing friends from the OLLI interest group, Navigating Retirement, talking animatedly, discussing a range of topics, telling jokes, laughing and enjoying being together while sharing a delicious potluck holiday meal.

This warm and festive gathering results from 12 OLLI members joining together in a new interest group, begun in September 2016 called Navigating Retirement (NR). Members of this group bonded over six original topics that Nancy Calvin and I led. Members enjoyed each other so much the group has continued to meet for monthly outings,

lunch, and conversations about finding fulfillment and fun in retirement. Group members take turns leading these outings, and friendships have deepened with time.

Navigating Retirement surpassed my and coleader Nancy
Calvin's expectations. We started this interest group after taking Jill Steinberg's great OLLI class, The Three Rs of Retirement. We

... on Turning 100: Living the moments, packing life full of experiences and people gathered from her activities

WHAT GIFT DO YOU GIVE A WOMAN TURNING 100?

For OLLI's Faye Alexander, who celebrated her 100th last November, make that a wet-suit jacket to replace her ratty one for her water aerobics classes three times a week.



"GROWTH IS THE ONLY SIGN OF LIVING"

And a party with 110 of her closest family and friends, a trip to Paris with a New York layover to visit a granddaughter, a salute from her grandson on NBC's Today show, and luncheon, dinner and party celebrations spilling over two months, plus a proclamation from the Santa Cruz County Board of Supervisors.

Not everyone gets the privilege of turning 100, and people often want to know Faye's secret.

With a Judi Dench-cropped hairstyle and smartly dressed in soft grays—matching sweater, cords and shoes—Faye looks at least three decades younger than her chronological age. Four years ago on a trip, Faye mentioned that she was 96 to a tour guide; he plopped to the ground in disbelief, especially since she looked younger than her 72-year-old companion.

"I guess if there is a secret to a good life, maybe this is it," says Faye, holding up a black, pocket-sized book with her active lifestyle penned in black ink across calendar pages, activities from OLLI classes to theater to family outings. In December, she was already booking into April. Faye admits the schedule could be dizzying to someone three-quarters her age.

"Of course, you start with good health, good mental abilities, good relationships with family and friends, and accomplishments, a sense of purpose," she says responding to how she has composed a good life for herself. "But I can't sit around and do nothing. I have to go out and do my activities."

At 100 she still drives during the day to nearby classes, the mall and downtown Santa Cruz to buy gifts for her French group's grab bag holiday event, to repay the kindness of a young woman who repaired jewelry and refused payment, and a friend who could benefit from a challenging crossword puzzle book.

Speaking several languages, Faye sums up her philosophy of life in French—la merde arrive—in a matter of fact manner. In English that translates to $sh_happens$. Her approach is to "think positively and do what you have to do."

"If I sit and moan and wail, what am I accomplishing? I am destroying myself and others. I don't mean that I don't feel, but I don't talk about it with others," she says explaining her philosophy to accept life and move forward. "You go on making a life for yourself."

When her granddaughter Rebecca was diagnosed with a rare genetic mutation that caused her simultaneously over time to lose her sight and hearing, Faye recalls telling her granddaughter, "Well Becky, you were never promised a rose garden." Her granddaughter, now in her 30s and a psychotherapist, has earned two masters' degrees from Columbia University, leads spin classes and regularly competes in extreme endurance races. Faye says she is often quoted by her granddaughter. Rebecca has penned her experiences in a memoir, *Not Fade Away*, and according to one review "greets every day as if it were a gift, with boundless energy, innate curiosity, and a strength of spirit" that inspires Faye.

"I CAN'T SIT AROUND AND DO NOTHING"

Wherever she lives, Faye says she believes in contributing to her community. A University of Chicago graduate who went on to earn two masters' degrees, Faye was responsible for getting a new school built, two school additions, afterschool programs, a Jewish community center, a stop light and a host of other civic contributions. When her husband retired to play golf, Faye left her position as assistant to the deputy superintendent of Chicago public schools at the height of her career. Not her timing, Faye practiced her acceptance philosophy. Her greatest accomplishments, she says, are her three children, all contributing members of society.

Moving to Santa Cruz, she joined her husband on the golf course, playing 26 years here after playing 42 years on courses elsewhere. She embraced Santa Cruz, making time to serve as an English as Second Language counselor to an influx of Saudi Arabian students (ARAMCO) to the University California at Santa Cruz. She served on the county's senior commission twice and became involved in the arts community. She joined OLLI about 11 years ago, the same year her husband died, and leads New Yorker and Great Books interest groups.

"It's easy to accomplish things; often it's making a phone call. You see something that needs attention. You express the need and you're nice about it," she says, recalling a time when she suggested the County of Santa Cruz follow the city's lead and start offering programs and field trips for senior citizens.

On a Santa Fe opera tour, Faye heard a guide mention that every professor on the college campus could lead a Great Books group. "I can do that," she thought to herself and returned to Santa Cruz to launch OLLI's first Great Books group.

"Growth is the only sign of living," she says, picking up a new iPhone that she's mastering.

With a belief that "it's never too late" Faye has banished the word "old" from her vocabulary. "Why would you accept a finality to your life? Older is acceptable, but not old. I will die not knowing so many things."

In the meantime, Faye is growth-focused, contemplating a 2018 African safari after visits this spring to the symphony, opera classes, and a host of engagements already in her black book.


