Politics and Ideology in the U.S. and Canadian Supreme Court



U.S. political scientists describe the Supreme Court as a political institution that regularly features ideological divisions. Bush v. Gore (2000) is the epitome of this attitudinal description (where a 5-4 conservative majority sided with Republican arguments on Florida's ballot counting rules). Recent Supreme Court nomination battles validate this political interpretation of the Supreme Court. But what about other Supreme Courts? Do they exhibit the same degree of ideological decision making, and if not why not? Canada's Supreme Court presents an obvious test case to explore this question. Matt Wetstein's lecture will cover some of the similarities and differences

between the two courts, and draw some conclusions about the political and ideological forces that shape judicial decision making across two high courts.

Matt Wetstein is in his third year as President of Cabrillo College. Prior to coming to Cabrillo he served as the Vice President of Instruction and Planning at San Joaquin Delta College in Stockton, California. He started his teaching career at Delta College in 1996 as a Political Science Professor. Matt holds a bachelor's degree in Political Science from the University of Saint Francis in Illinois, and Masters and Doctoral degrees in Political Science from Northern Illinois University. His dissertation analyzed abortion rates in the 50 U.S states and was later published by SUNY Press. His published research has focused on abortion politics in the U.S. and more recently on comparative judicial decision making, particularly focusing on the Supreme Court of Canada. He and his wife Cindy Ostberg have published more than a dozen articles and three books on the decisions of the Canadian Court, including a book in 2017 titled *Value Change in the Supreme Court of Canada* (University of Toronto Press).



Modern Molecular Biology

Saturday Mornings, 10:30 - Noon, 7, 14, 21 November and 5 December.

A typical animal cell contains more that 40,000 different kinds of molecules. In the past 20 years great progress has been made in understanding how these molecules combine and interact to form a living creature.

As in previous years Professor Emeritus Barry Bowman will organize the course and offer two lectures. Two other professors from the Molecular, Cell and Developmental Biology Department at UCSC will present lectures covering topics related to their research programs.

These talks are intended for a general audience. A scientific background or knowledge of biology is not expected. Barry Bowman, the course coordinator, will begin with a basic review of genes, proteins and cells.

- Lecture #1. Professor Emeritus Barry Bowman, An introduction to the basics of molecular biology
- Lecture #2. Assistant Professor Josh Arribere, How quality control protects our cells
- Lecture #3. Professor Martha Zuniga, SARS Wars: Immune defenses against SARS-CoV-2 and COVID-19 pathology
- Lecture #4. Professor Emeritus Barry Bowman, Digging deeper into DNA


There are the other advantages that the courses are free, no parking problems; there is time for an extra cup of coffee, etc. etc. See you in class!

Many of us miss him as a friend and as a generous asset to OLLI.


A note from UCSC

It is with a very heavy heart that I share the <u>news of the passing of UC Santa Cruz Vice Chancellor Emeritus Hal Hyde</u>. Hal, who helped transform our campus from a working ranch to a globally known teaching and research institution, died peacefully of natural causes on Monday, Oct. 12, at his home in Corralitos. He was 97.

It is not an overstatement to say that Santa Cruz County is the cultural and intellectual hub it is today in large part because of Hal, shaped by his commitment to and vision for the place his family has called home for generations. He was a key player in the creation of not only UC Santa Cruz, but of Cabrillo College, too, as well as the Community Foundation of Santa Cruz County and the Cultural Council of Santa Cruz County. Certainly many others played a role in our county's evolution from an agricultural region to a center of innovation and education, but Hal was the person people called when they wanted vision transformed into reality. He got things done, and we are a better campus and community because of it.
