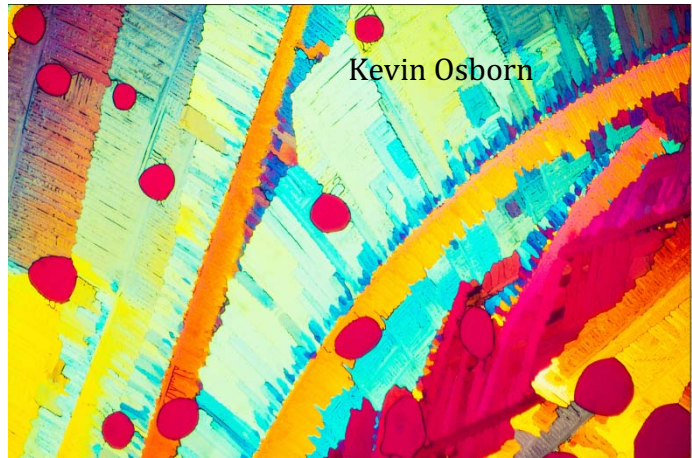

Quantum Mechanics ♦ Roger Knacke, Professor Emeritus, Physics and Astronomy for Non-Scientists London Nelson CC, Tuesdays 10:30: Jan 30, Feb 6, 13, 20, 27



Quantum Mechanics is the study of nature at its most fundamental levels. Quantum effects impact our lives through computers, phones, television, electronics, missiles, nuclear weapons, and many other ways. Yet the basic ideas are not well understood by non-scientists. This course introduces quantum concepts in intuitive, nonmathematical ways for those without a science background. Revolutionary ideas and their impact beyond science, such as philosophy and literature, is discussed. Along the way, we meet the genius, eccentric, and controversial personalities of the field's founders. You won't become an expert in quantum theory but you'll see how quantum ideas transform our understanding of nature and the universe.

Dr Knacke has AB and PhD degrees in physics from UC Berkeley. His research focused on interstellar matter and planetary atmosphere. He has taught ten intriguing and very popular classes for OLLI.

Technological Toolkits ♦ **Terry Burke**, UCSC Professor, World History, retired
Susan Douglass, Professor, Center for Contemporary Arab Studies, Georgetown University
London Nelson CC, Fridays 10:30: Feb 2, 9, 16, 23



Where and when did the technological building blocks of the modern world first emerge? The answer, you may be surprised to learn, is not in Europe, and not necessarily in modern times. As a continuation of our two 2023 courses, we propose an alternative global history of technology not involving key inventions like the algorithm, the printing press, and the compass. The course identifies ten essential technological complexes of toolkits that, rather than stemming from Europe, originated elsewhere and gradually diffused to the lands of Islam, where they were made available. We begin with a general overview of the project. Each of the next sessions explores the tangled history of a toolkit and its role in the Modern Transformation: mining/pyrotechnological textile, and medical/pharmacological toolkits.

Dr Burke began the UCSC Center for World History and is an originator of an online world history curriculum (World History for Us All),. Dr Douglass is Education Outreach Coordinator at the Center for Contemporary Arab Studies at Georgetown University.

The Holocaust ♦ **Peter Kenez**, Professor Emeritus, History
Murray Baumgarten, Distinguished Professor Emeritus, English &
Comparative Literature **London Nelson CC**, Fridays 1:00: Mar 1, 8, 15



We are privileged to have a course based on the acclaimed UCSC class taught on campus by these two professors. It traces destruction of the Jews and Jewish life in Europe by Nazi Germany, drawing on history, literature, and film. Dr Kenez is a historian specializing in Russian and Eastern European history and politics. Dr Baumgarten was co-director of Jewish Studies and founding director of the Dickens Project at UCSC.

Climate Science and Solutions ♦ **Pauline Seales**, Santa Cruz Climate Action Network
London Nelson CC, Wednesdays 10:30: Mar 6, 13, 20, 27



Most people are aware that Climate Change is accelerating. Using nontechnical language, we look at the basic science, recent impacts, ongoing solutions, and other options. Attendees are encouraged to bring laptops to use interactive websites. We all want to leave a better world for younger generations and we can do a great deal without joining a Washington protest. The focus will be positive. A background in science is not required.

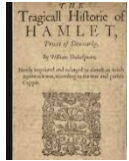

Santa Cruz Shakespeare ♦ Michael Warren, Professor Emeritus, Literature
Zoom Only, Tuesdays 10:00: Mar 5, 12, 19, 26, Apr 2

The texts for this series of five lectures will be two plays that Shakespeare wrote around 1599-1600, when he was the preeminent playwright in London.



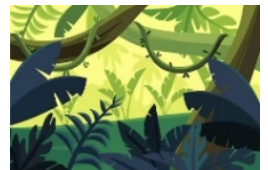
As You Like It is a comedy of unusual amplitude and variety. Set initially in a court and then in a pastoral countryside, it features romantic love, cross-dressing and mistaken identity, witty dialogue, a sophisticated jester, a melancholy philosophical commentary, a wise shepherd, many songs, and even Hymen, the god of marriage. It also considers seriously the structure and conduct of human society in court and country and the nature of male and female behavior, particularly in relation to power, desire, and love.



Probably the most famous of Shakespeare's plays, *Hamlet*, needs no introduction, only some reminders: Claudius, Gertrude, Polonius, Ophelia, Laertes, Fortinbras, Horatio, and Rosencrantz and Guildenstern; a touring company of players; some sailors; two gravediggers; a Ghost who calls for revenge... Fratricide, a problematic succession; an international territorial dispute; a play within a play; two rash killings; two mad scenes; a suicide (perhaps); a duel; multiple deaths... Intellectual uncertainties; moral dilemmas; philosophical reflections; "To be or not to be..."

Dr Warren has been the Dramaturge and Textual Consultant for Shakespeare Santa Cruz since its inception. This is the fourteenth year he shares his deep understanding and love of Shakespeare's plays with OLLI members, enhancing our experience of the summer festival.

The Amazon and Humankind ♦ David Sweet, Professor Emeritus, History
London Nelson CC, Tuesdays 10:30: Apr 9, 16, 23, 30



The vast Amazon basin is a unique, little-known space on our planet, whose unique history can enlighten in many ways the history of the whole human race. This course will demonstrate the truth of that claim through eight 45-minute stories, proceeding in chronological order.

The first says nothing at all about human beings; the second follows our humankind as we learned to live there and thrive for some ten thousand years. The third and fourth stories introduce European actors in their "discovery" of that space and its inhabitants and examines the chaos introduced (mostly by Portuguese) of a barely functional "society without government" in 17th and 18th centuries. The fifth story describes an impoverished, short-lived colonial government, bloody "caste war" against historic oppression, and incorporation of Amazonia into the independent Empire of Brazil, followed by the slow introduction of politics, the end of monarchy, foreign investment, and 19th-century industrial capitalism in the sixth story. Foreign immigration, urbanization, and neglect by the government of Brazil, culminating in a US-supported military dictatorship bent on exploiting Amazonia wealth at all costs is the seventh story. The final story explores developments, both horrifying and hopeful, for Amazonia and the world since the return to Brazilian democracy in 1984.

Dr Sweet taught Latin American (especially Mexican) and Early Modern history for thirty years at UCSC. Always an activist, he was a co-founder of Witness for Peace in the 1980s.

New Location for Courses

The London Nelson Community Center will be the new home for most OLLI courses, in a building that used to be Laurel School. We will be returning to real classrooms. There is a small parking lot adjacent to the Police Station on the corner of Laurel and Center (3 hours free). Free parking for 2 hours is also available on Washington, Maple and Center streets. A free permit from the Center gives you 3 hours of free parking on these streets in areas with signs that say “LNC permit.”

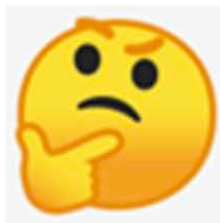

One of the many benefits of our OLLI program is having a community of people who love to learn. Mark Gordon put it well when he said, "I love being with humans. From what I see at most OLLI gatherings, I'm not alone. The buzz is infectious with happiness, and conversations bubble over." While offering intellectual stimulation, the classes, interest groups and meetings also bring an important sense of community.

In spite of Covid's enormous challenge, we learned to use Zoom to keep in touch; now we can do that *and* assemble for face-to-face meetings. One of the challenges of aging is that our memories, or lack of them, occasionally trip us up, especially when 2-3 years have passed in relative isolation. Mark reminded me of a handy hack to handle our returning conviviality. It's actually an old one—NAME BADGES! For him they are a "gift from heaven." 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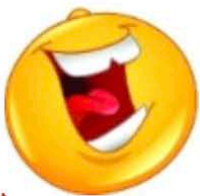
