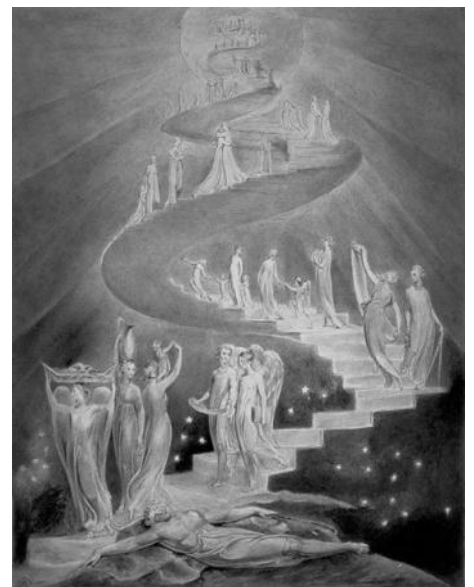
On Dreams and Dreaming. Michal Aizenmann

Explore the world of dreams in this class, which presents a broad view on dreams with an emphasis on the work of C. G. Jung, as we ask ourselves: What are dreams? How do we understand them? What is their function? And how do we best utilize them in our lives?

Beginning with an overview of theories on dreams throughout history, starting with antiquity and arriving at the most recent research on the brain, sleep, and dreaming, we’ll explore dream material in light of the theories presented and learn to unravel the language of dreams and their imagery. By the end of our exploration we’ll understand how to connect with and make good use of dreams in our daily lives.

Michal Aizenman, MA, IAAP, was born in Israel where she trained and worked as a Clinical Psychologist and Jungian Analyst in different settings —

Last year's class was an investigation into the art of some of Italian opera's greatest stars through the centuries, starting in the 17th. This year we will explore works by Boileau, Massenet, Thomas, Saint-Saëns, Offenbach, Delibes, Bizet, Gounod, as well as operas written in French by Donizetti and Rossini. We will study seminal representative styles of arias, duets, ensembles, and choruses, which reflect the

astounding riches of the human voice and the genius of selected composers. There will be video and recordings of the artists.

Miriam Ellis' work in teaching French language has been recognized by the French government which awarded her one of its highest academic honors, the *Palmes Academiques*. She combines her lifelong interest in drama and opera with the teaching of French and has staged a number of theatrical and musical productions at UCSC. She has translated French operas for productions here.

Miriam's classes for Lifelong Learners have been lively, interesting, and informative.

The class will meet in the Lounge at the Congregational Church, 900 High St., on three Thursdays, March 3rd, 10th, and 17th, from 1 to 4 p.m.

Two Shakespeare Plays:
Shakespeare Santa Cruz.

This summer, world-renowned Shakespeare Santa Cruz will present several plays, two of them by Shakespeare: *The Comedy of Errors* and *Henry IV, Part One*. We are fortunate to have Michael Warren, a very knowledgeable and vastly entertaining Shakespeare scholar presenting a four-session short course on these plays in May. His course for us last spring has been enthusiastically praised by our members.

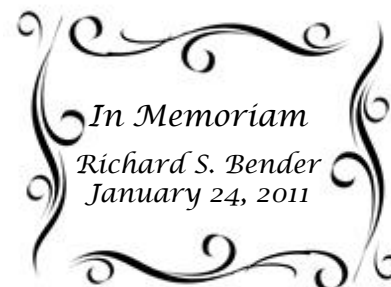
Michael Warren is an emeritus professor of literature at UCSC, and has been a consultant to S.C. Shakespeare for many years. When

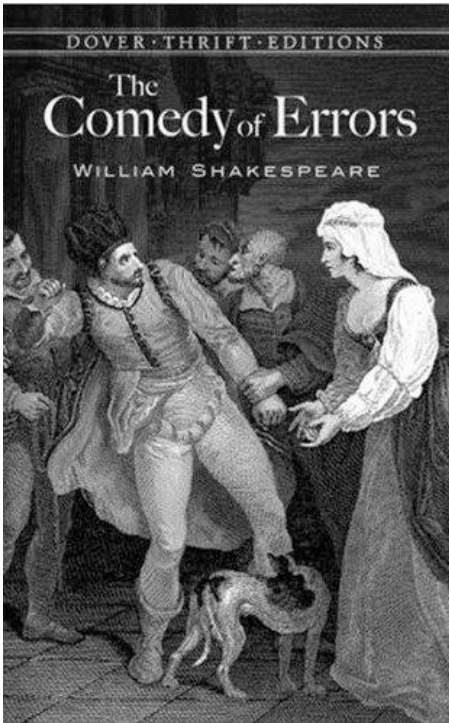
he was awarded the Alumni Association's Distinguished Teaching Award he was described as follows:

"Warren teaches his courses with a sense of humor, a love of his subjects, and a great desire to see his students learn. He strives to make Shakespeare's plays and other literature understandable, exciting, and accessible."

Students should bring either copies of the individual plays or a collected works (preferably with numbered lines) to each class. The first class will be devoted to a brief introduction to the two plays in the context of Shakespeare's career, and then to studying

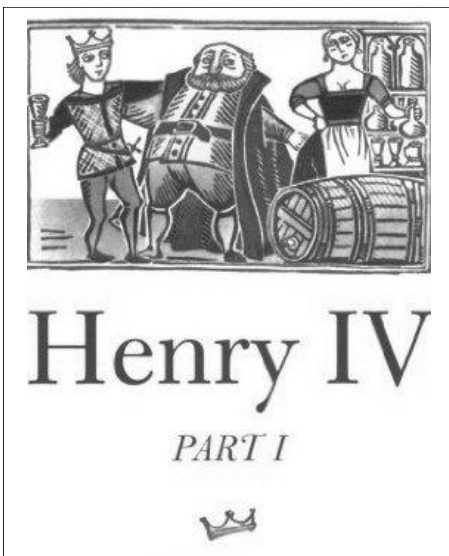
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The Comedy of Errors, which students should have read before the class meets. *Errors* is the shortest of the Shakespeare plays, and we will cover at least the first three acts (perhaps four) at the first meeting.

The class will meet on Tuesday mornings, May 3rd, 10th, 17th, and 24th, from 10 to noon, at the Museum of Art & History on Front Street, Santa Cruz.

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From Osher LLI at UCSC President, Nancy Mead

We received good news this past month. Our application to the Osher Foundation was approved, and we will once again receive from them an amount of \$50,000. This covers the year 2011, and represents “seed money” to support us as we prepare to apply for their actual endowment toward the end of this year. We have many projects brewing and many ideas for how to improve the services on which we all depend, so the money is most welcome. Among the things we hope to acquire is a professionally-designed data base, specifically attuned to our needs. This will facilitate our record-keeping and thereby expedite our membership services. We also plan a change insuring that our mail will be handled in a more timely fashion.

Considerable time has been spent recently in reviewing our financial situation, anticipating the needs of the coming year. It has occurred to me that sharing these matters with you would be appropriate. The fact that we receive the Osher grant can readily lead to the notion that our Lifelong Learning Institute is flush with funds and able to do almost anything. In actuality, this is not the case.

First of all, it should be made clear that we now are compensating the

University for at least some of the services they make available to us. In addition, new expenditures last year included things such as making shuttle service available at our meetings; adding to our printed matter; and providing rent for larger meeting spaces. The latter was necessitated by the increased enrollment in our classes and interest groups. The above, along with other rental and postage expenses, were paid out of Osher monies. From fees we collect we also were able to increase the value of book awards made to re-entry students. This was deemed desirable when it became clear that textbooks often cost as much as \$200.00 each. Currently we give book awards of \$900.00 a year to each of twenty students. By the end of the past calendar year we had virtually no funds remaining to carry over in any budget category.

The board of directors looks carefully at each new proposal requiring financial support. By and large, their scrutiny concerns itself with the extent to which an expenditure furthers the mission of our particular lifelong-learning endeavor. First and foremost, we are committed to providing learning opportunities for “seasoned adults.” Additionally, for over twenty years we also have been committed to helping

re-entry students with their book purchases. The actual breakdown of expenses is available for all members to see in our yearly statements.

Next year we will be poised to receive the Osher endowment of one million dollars. That is, we fit the criteria they have established for their programs and have well-satisfied the requirement of 500 members. However, what we realize from that endowment will be a yearly pay-out that is actually somewhat less than the \$50,000 Osher supplied in each of two previous years. So we are unable to project ever-increasing services. Nonetheless, we believe the endowment is of great value because it gives a foundation of financial support that will be impervious to the economic and budgetary exigencies of either the times or the University. Should you have questions regarding these financial matters you may wish to contact our treasurer, David Copp.

On another note: look for an announcement regarding the opening of the Art Show, featuring the work of our members. You’ll be receiving it sometime in March. We’re all to be invited to attend the opening reception. I hope to see you there.

Getting to Know You

Jim Faris: Founder and Leader

Jim and his wife Paula moved to the West Side of Santa Cruz in 1983 to be near their son Brian. Jim enrolled in Human Evolution, Anthropology, and Philosophy classes for his own enlightenment while Paula participated in Women's Studies. Oakes College had begun a program, "Elders in Residence," to fill dormitory vacancies, affording Jim and four friends an opportunity to start Lifelong Learners; they were inspired by an informal trend to provide social opportunities through adult learning in colleges throughout the country. Cardiff House was the meeting place and speakers were scheduled through the University's Speakers Bureau. Recalling the times, Jim says that "it was as easy as rubbing two sticks together and voilà, Lifelong Learners, an organization that has made living here more stimulating and fun."

Jim continued in a leadership role in UCSC's Lifelong Learners, serving as the third president of a friendly 45-member organization, helping write our bylaws, composing our first newsletter, and beginning the first Interest Group, "Biography Writing." He still leads the twenty-year-old Film Discussion Seminar and is celebrated at our Sunday meetings by his wide circle of friends and acquaintance as our only remaining founding member.

Jim was born in 1919 in Kansas City to a high-achieving Irish family with four children. His mother performed in vaudeville, following her father's example, influencing Jim to join a youth theatre group where he met actors like Norman Rose and two-time Academy Award winner Luise Rainer. He also worked in his hometown for Mr. Hall of Hallmark Cards.



Thinking he might become a lawyer, Jim attended night school at George Washington University, then switched, doing a short stint in business school. But he was always intoxicated by movies, and he directed all his efforts toward a career in that expanding industry. As an example, piano lessons in his youth enabled him to read music which helped qualify him as a cartoon editor, since cartoons are based on musical timing.

He migrated to California in 1943 to work in post-production. He never looked back over the ensuing forty years, and always found exciting opportunities to grow professionally while working with stimulating and enjoyable people. His post-production work on the movies *Gaslight*, *National Velvet*, and *Taps* was highly rewarding and gave him the expertise to meet the challenge of faster-paced editing in the expanding television industry. Jim edited old favorites *Ozzie and Harriet* and *Hawaiian Eye*, and some westerns, and he even directed an episode of *Lawman*. In 1960 he went to Fox, then to Paramount, until he retired in 1983 after working for Aaron Spelling.

Jim met the love of his life, Paula, while editing Tom and Jerry cartoons for MGM. Jim was bowled over by a statuesque Katharine Hepburn look-alike, playing volleyball on the company lot at lunchtime.

It took him a couple of years, but Paula was eventually won over by Jim's persistence and eccentricity, a notable attraction still evident. They married on June 6th, 1948, and have co-starred to produce three children: Brian, a local contractor, Jim, a graphic designer in Mountain View, and Valerie, who with her husband is a film director. Jim beams as he talks about Valerie's success in "Little Miss Sunshine." In turn, their children have blessed Paula and Jim with seven thriving grandchildren.

Although he is a nonagenarian, Jim is fully engaged in life and learning. His life has included racing sailboats in Newport Beach, operating a ham radio with call letters K6BUX, baking bread, attending classes at UCSC, becoming a real estate agent, pursuing a fitness regime, social dancing, keeping up with technology, leading his unique film group, thrilling to grandchildren, and evaluating scripts sent by daughter Valerie. Yet Paula and Jim have found time to enjoy traveling, twice renting a VW camper and traveling through Europe with three children. They also joined Elderhostel in travels to England and Ireland.

With his zest for life, Jim is a breath of good news and up feelings, and sees his cup overflowing with boundless opportunities. He continues engaging life with enthusiasm, following H. H. "Breaker" Morant's advice, "live every day as if it were your last and then some day you'll be right."

For those who know him, it's plain that Jim Faris has enjoyed a life well lived!
