Our Speaker for April


Dan Costa is the Director of the Institute of Marine Science at UCSC. After growing up in southern California he received a BA degree from UCLA and a PhD from UC Santa Cruz. He was a postdoctoral fellow at the Scripps Institution of Oceanography and returned to UCSC as a member of the faculty. Professor Costa is one of the world's leading experts on marine mammals and seabirds. He has done research with many kinds of animals around the world. Early on, he saw the potential for tracking animals by tagging them with small, lightweight devices. This has led to an explosion in the amount of information we have not only about the animals, but also



about many other features of the world's oceans. Dan is also an excellent photographer. Don't miss his presentation at the April General Meeting.

President's Message

OLLI and Bowling Alone



At a recent meeting of an OLLI interest group Lee Abramson discussed the book *Bowling Alone*. The book was a surprise best seller when first published in 2000. It has now been revised and updated. When I was growing up in Waukesha, Wisconsin, bowling was a big part of our social life. Groups of all ages would frequently get together at a bowling alley, and many people belonged to a bowling league. The book examines how participation in bowling leagues, and many other group social activities, has dramatically declined. Robert Putnam, the author, argues that this decline in social and community engagement has negative effects on our welfare, health and happiness. His conclusions are supported by the Harvard Study of Adult Development, a research program that has monitored the health and activities of several cohorts of people for more than 80 years.

The study found that good social relationships "help to delay mental and physical decline and are better predictors of long and happy lives than social class, IQ, or even genes."

I have not been bowling in a long time, but I have been active in OLLI. The social aspect of OLLI is not just a fringe benefit; it is a primary goal written in our by-laws. A key component of our interest groups, general meetings and classes is generating an environment where people can really interact and exchange ideas.

During the Covid pandemic our opportunities for social interaction have certainly been reduced. In the last six months we have started to get together again, but the number of members participating in our activities has not yet returned to previous levels. This presents us with a challenging problem. On the one hand the risk of getting Covid has declined; however, the risk is still real. A viral infection, especially for our age group, can lead to serious illness. On the other hand it is important not to become socially isolated. Each of us has to weigh the risks and rewards of social activity in the light of our own circumstances. If you participate via Zoom, let us see your face and hear your voice. For our "in person" meetings we try to have large, well-ventilated rooms. Wear a mask. I am concerned that some people are limiting their participation, not because of the Covid risk, but because they have just gotten out of the habit of leaving the house and traveling to meet with a group of people. Don't isolate yourself. OLLI is about more than adult education. OLLI is good for you - in many ways.

Transition: From STARS to University Relations

History

From the earliest days of Lifelong Learners, which began in the mid 80s, we had a special relationship with one campus organization: STARS. An acronym, it stands for Services for Transfer and Re-Entry Students. It felt natural to be connected with STARS because Lifelong Learners members in many ways thought of themselves as re-entry students.

One early President of Lifelong Learners, Silvia Miller, developed a plan to support Re-Entry students through a scholarship program that has continued to this day. Thus began our decadeslong cordial relationship with STARS. We felt it was our home at UCSC.

Corinne Miller, the STARS Director for 27 years, became our Campus Liaison. STARS folks arranged whatever we needed: rental of spaces, food for meetings, and payments to vendors, among many other things. In addition, STARS offered us a space on campus to pursue our relationship with the university and, ultimately, with the Bernard Osher Foundation.

Corinne was instrumental in helping UCSC, the Osher Foundation and Lifelong Learners forge an agreement that provides us with significant annual funding. In 2011, Lifelong Learners became the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at UCSC or OLLI. Because of this funding, our fees for membership and courses are very low. All of us in OLLI owe a debt of gratitude to Corinne for her skillful support during that transition.

Corinne Miller retired in 2012. Sally Lester who had worked with Corinne for many years became STARS Director and Campus Liaison with OLLI. After Sally retired in 2017, Sara Radoff, the new STARS Director became our Campus Liaison. We are very grateful for the service to OLLI provided by Corinne, Sally, Sara, and recent STARS staff members Jannet Ceja and DeShonne Keller.

The Change

Another transition is now afoot. Due to reorganization within UCSC, the University has decided to move our Campus Liaison relationship from STARS to a different division of UCSC, University Relations. This division supports all the University Friends groups, of which we are a part. So, going forward, STARS will no longer be handling all of our business affairs. However, our relationship with STARS will happily continue through our scholarship program.

Naturally, this is a big transition. However, we have been well supported during this time by the University. We are grateful to our transitional Campus Liaison, Dani Barker, who has deftly helped us as we emerge from the pandemic and face this change. The Board has recently met our new Campus Liaison, Barbara Oden-Petree. She has already worked to get to know the special qualities of OLLI and we are happy to welcome her partnership. Those of us on the OLLI Board have enjoyed her warm engaging presence at our recent meetings. We hope many of you will get to know her in the months and years to come.

Modern Molecular Biology

Saturdays, April 1, 8, 15, 22; 10:30 AM - Noon

Location: UCSC, Physical Science Building, Room 240, and Zoom.

The course will be taught by four Professors from the Department of Molecular, Cell and Developmental Biology at UCSC.

1 April -- Barry Bowman - Introduction to Molecular Biology

8 April -- Bill Saxton – The Biology of the Cell

15 April -- Olena Vaske – The Genetics of Pediatric Cancer

22 April -- Dan Turner-Evans - Neurobiology

A typical plant or animal cell contains more than 40,000 different kinds of molecules. Great progress has been made in understanding how these molecules combine and interact to form a living creature. In this course four UCSC Professors will talk about recent discoveries in molecular biology.

Professor Barry Bowman, the course coordinator, will begin with a basic review of genes and proteins. Professor Saxton will explain the basic structure and function of cells. Professor Vaske is focused on understanding the mutations in DNA that cause childhood cancers. Professor Turner-Evans is using marvelous new tools to see how neurons in the brain generate memories and responses.

These talks are intended for a general audience. A scientific background or knowledge of biology is not expected.

Eight by Hitchcock

Thursdays, April 6, 13, 20, 27, May 4, 11, 18, 25; 10:00 AM – 1:00 PM

Location: Museum of Art and History, 705 Front St.

Instructor: Bill Park

In recent years, many critics have read Hitchcock's films as revealing the misogynistic work of a pathologically disturbed individual. Others have defended the films as proponents of romantic love. This course will address these issues, while primarily regarding the films as works of a great artist. The course offers a feast of Alfred Hitchcock's best ranging from 1927 to 1959.



Bill Park is Professor Emeritus of Literature at Sarah Lawrence College, where he taught for many years. He received his PhD in Eighteenth Century English Literature from Columbia University. He has written extensively about literature and film. We are fortunate that he has moved to Santa Cruz and is eager to share his knowledge with us. Our members who have attended his classes were impressed by his encyclopedic knowledge of film and literature

Power and Resistance in Pre-Hispanic Latin American Art

Mondays, April 10, 24, May 8, 22; 1:00 - 2:30 PM Location: On Zoom only. Instructor: Katie Ligmond

What do empires have in common? They all engage in conquests, violence, powerful takeovers of other people, but they have another program that is just as integral to their success: ideological messages in artistic programming. They all have something else in common, too: a legion of subjects that resist them. In Power and Resistance in Pre-Hispanic Latin American Art



we will look at four powerful players in the early Americas. First, we will foray into Mexico and discuss the complex religious and cosmological art forms of the Maya and the later Mexica (Aztec). We will discuss their conceptions of women and how the people who lived on the peripheries of their power navigated their own identity as subjects and individual agents. Then, we'll move to another American power center, the Andes. There we will discuss the colorful and kaleidoscopic world of textiles and their impressive status in the region among the Wari and the Inka. In this class we will have an opportunity to discuss gender dynamics, artworks outside the Western paradigm, and the central role of ideology in the formation of empires.

Katie Ligmond is a 6th year Ph.D. candidate in the Department of History of Art and Visual Culture at the University of California, Santa Cruz. She received her undergraduate degree at the University of California, Berkeley in 2016 with high honors in History of Art for a paper on images on Colonial Latin America. Currently, she is writing her dissertation entitled Deliberate Confusion: The Role of Abstraction in Imperial Andean Textile Design, which focuses on the ways the Wari and Inka empires used textiles to control their subjects. She also researches Indigenous interpretations of Catholicism in the Colonial Americas, particularly focusing on the Virgin Mary.

Contemporary Economic Policy Issues: Economic Inequality

Tuesdays, May 2, 9, 16, 23; 10:00 - 11:30 AM

Location, On Zoom only Instructor: Jon Haveman

This course is given by NEED, the National Economic Education Delegation. "NEED uses the skills and knowledge of a vast network of professional economists to promote a nonpartisan understanding of the economics of policy issues in the United States." They have successfully presented courses to many OLLIs across the country.

This group presented a course for us last Fall. Many of us found it a valuable opportunity to learn about contemporary economics. Economic inequality is certainly a pressing issue of our time.

Jon Haveman has a PhD in Economics from the University of Michigan. Dr. Haveman is an expert on regional economies and local economic development and on the Bay Area Economy in particular. He is also widely considered to be one of California's leading experts on the economics of seaports, goods movement, and international trade policy. Those who enroll in this course will receive the Zoom link a few days before the beginning of the class.

Women in the Ancient Western World

Location: Museum of Art and History, 705 Front St.

Instructor: Gail Greenwood

Have you ever wondered what we're doing with bunnies bringing eggs at Easter, and pine trees covered with baubles to celebrate the birth of a Jewish baby? Gail Greenwood did, and it never made sense to her until she learned about women's history. She is now offering us an 8-hour survey course she's calling "Women in the Ancient Western World." The primary idea examined will be that the story changes when the point of view of the storyteller changes; though the facts may be the same, the significance of the facts and even which dates matter alter when viewed from women's rather than from men's perspective. The course will begin with Prehistory — The Great Mother and her cave children, with an examination of why we don't

begin with the Greeks — followed with the Ancient Near East, Egypt, and Crete. Then we will (in a great sweep of thousands of years in an hour or two) look at ancient and classical Greece, Rome, and the Judeo-Christian heritage.

Gail Greenwood is a retired community college history teacher. For thirty-four years, she taught survey courses in American History, Western Civilization, and Women in both American and Western Civilization. In the 1970s she created the first Women in American History courses at American River College.

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Tax Filing Deadline Extended for Storm Victims

The Franchise Tax Board of California has extended to Oct 16, 2023, the filing deadline for taxpayers impacted by 2022-23 winter storms.

The IRS announced tax relief for Californians affected by winter storms. Only affected taxpayers qualify for an extension to Oct 16, 2023, to file individual and business tax returns and make certain tax payments, which include the following:

- Individual tax returns and payments due Apr 18, 2023
- Quarterly estimated tax payments due Jan 17, Mar 15, Apr 18, Jun 15, and Sep 15 of 2023
- Business entity tax returns due Mar 15 and Apr 18
- Pass-through entity elective tax payments due Mar 15 and Jun 15 of 2023

Postponement of time to file and pay does <u>not</u> apply to the following seven counties: Imperial, Kern, Lassen, Modoc, Plumas, Shasta, and Sierra.
